Jan. 7 Living in Every Direction: The Key to a 3-Dimensional Faith **Rev. David Owen O'Quill**

Sometimes our spiritual lives can feel a bit tedious. We may feel like this whole “God” thing just leaves us feeling flat. But religion doesn't need to be that way. Faith is not a one-dimensional exercise. Faith is a full-out, multi-layered, multi-media spiritual journey when we know the secret to it. Come listen to Rev. Dr. David Owen-O'Quill share with us the secrets to living a 3-dimensional life of faithful adventure.

Rev. Dr. Owen-O'Quill has spent the last six years pastoring a congregation in Corpus Christi, Texas. In those years, the church nearly doubled in size, built a new building, started covenant group ministry and a contemporary service to reach the un-churched. He has recently moved to Chicago and is leading a new church ministry called Micah's Porch. Micah's Porch is focused on launching churches to reach a new generation with the loving message of our faith. The Micah's Porch vision is to be a contemporary front porch experience where strangers become neighbors and neighbors become friends on a mission to do justice, love mercy and walk humbly with your God.

Jan. 14 Where Do We Go From Here? Chaos or Community? **Rev. Finley Campbell**

Before Dr. King died, he had a vision, which later he saw as a dream, that despite all his efforts toward non-violent social change, another kind of racism was emerging on the horizon that brought together race and class. In this last “Will and Testament” he offers us a terrifying choice – either we move toward community as a nation and as a world or we shall default into chaos. The purpose of this sermon therefore is to consolidate some and win others to the task of using multi-racial unity as the force to defeat the chaos and to achieve the community.

Rev. Campbell is a UU and an ordained Baptist minister in the social humanist tradition of Reverends A.D. Redd, Martin Luther King Jr, and James Meeks, the historical tradition of progressive Baptists worldwide. He has served as a pulpit assistant at several churches, including being a member of the Morehouse College Chapel Committee in the 1960s. He is Professor Emeritus at DeVry Institute. He is working under the leadership of Rabbi Michael Lerner in the Network of Spiritual Progressives and is a member of the First Unitarian Church of Chicago.

Jan. 21 Tolerance Has its Limits **Rev. Dr. Sarah Oelberg**

Tolerance has always been one of the basic principles of Unitarian Universalism. Yet sometimes it can be difficult to practice an optimum amount of tolerance. Is tolerance always a virtue?

Rev. Oelberg is a retired UU minister, having served churches in Nebraska and Minnesota. Before entering the ministry, she was a special education teacher and then Professor of Education at Yeshiva University, NYU, and Buena Vista College in Iowa. She is married and has four children and six grandchildren. She and her husband, Jerry, enjoy camping, square and folk dancing, living in Milwaukee, and now baby-sitting for the newest grandchild. Rev. Oelberg is the author of the pamphlet, “The Faith of a Unitarian Universalist Humanist,” which can be found in our pamphlet rack across from the church offices.

Jan. 28 Communicating Compassionately **Vid Axel**

What gets into people such that they lose touch with their compassionate nature and instead communicate and interact violently? By contrast, how is it that some people manage - even in the face of the most stressful circumstances - to remain connected with their compassionate nature and to communicate and interact in peaceful, assertive and life-enriching ways? This service will explore and demonstrate the spirituality, personal power and practical application of the process of Communicating Compassionately, which is based on the work of visionary peacemaker Marshall B. Rosenberg, Ph.D., author of *Nonviolent Communication: A Language of Life*.

Vid Axel is a member of Countryside Church and facilitates two covenant groups, the Communicating Compassionately Support Group, and the Open Forum Discussion; he serves as co-chair of the Membership Committee. Vid's passion for Communicating Compassionately was first inspired more than a year ago when Anne Ward and Bob Sandidge presented their Speaking Peace series here.

For those of you who are looking for a simple way to buy household cleaning products, personal care products and cosmetics that have not been tested on animals, visit the website www.caringconsumer.com. More than 500 companies have banned all animal tests, so you will have no problem finding alternatives.

Fortunately, scientists have developed sophisticated product tests that are faster, cheaper, and far more accurate than blinding and poisoning tests, which were developed in the 1920s. Human cell cultures and artificial human “skin” and “eyes” mimic the body’s natural properties, and a number of computer virtual organs serve as accurate models of human body parts.

Welcoming Congregation Committee Movie Night & Discussion

The welcoming congregation committee is pleased to present the movie Stonewall on Friday, January 19 at 7:30 pm in Atherton Hall. Admission is free. Discussion will follow. This film is a fictionalized account of real events. It follows six people’s lives and the events which led up to the Stonewall Inn riot in Greenwich Village in 1969. Sunday, January 21

REMINDER: If you propose a new item, you are responsible for providing cost estimates for your idea prior to meeting #2 (seems only fair, doesn't it?)

Step 2: Building the Budget Potluck Meeting

Saturday, February 24

EVERYONE IS INVITED to share a dish and then make the choices that will become our proposed budget for 2007-08. Salaries/fixed costs will be reviewed, committees will present funding requests at three different spending levels, and new items will be considered. Great discussion takes place and **this is where the congregation makes the choices that will shape our programs for next year**. And we have fun doing it!!

SAVE THE DATE & BE A PART OF THIS PROCESS!

Step 3: The Annual Canvass

March 2007

This will start at the Budget-Building meeting and run through March. Our pledges for next year make up 85-90% of our Operating Revenues, so this is how we pay for the goals that we express in our Proposed Budget. A Celebration Luncheon will be given after the service on Sunday, March 11 to celebrate the current year and look ahead to next year's goals.

Step 4: Budget Reconciliation

May 2007

This is usually held at the Annual Meeting in May to reconcile any differences between the Proposed Budget and the revenues raised from the Canvass. This year, let's plan to raise MORE money than expected and decide how to spend the extra!! Either way, we will leave this meeting with a Balanced Budget for next year and a GREAT SENSE OF ACCOMPLISHMENT.

So please save the dates and plan on being part of our church democracy at work. You have good ideas; please come share them with us!

Worship Council Forges Ahead

With holiday services behind them, and a calendar full through March, the Worship Council has begun focusing on streamlining its processes in preparation for the arrival of our new interim minister in February. The Worship Council always welcomes your comments and ideas about our services at Countryside Church, so we thought now would be a good time to let you know who we are so you can contact us! Who's That Standing Next to the Minister?

That's a Worship Associate you're seeing in the sanctuary next to the minister or guest speaker at our services these days. You started seeing people in this new role in late November, and can expect to see them now at every service. Worship Associates are trained members of the congregation who are charged with a number of responsibilities:

- Helping the minister plan the service, and coordinating with others who need to be involved (e.g. the Music Director).
- On behalf of the congregation, reading the welcoming remarks and announcements, lighting the chalice, leading the reading of the covenant, and inviting the gifts at the offertory.
- Assisting the minister with readings requiring more than one voice, and finding appropriate resources in the congregation for special parts of services.
- Serving in all the above roles, plus more, when coordinating with a guest minister or speaker.

Considering that we were facing a number of pulpit guests, plus the arrival of an interim minister, the Worship Council decided it was important to go ahead with this role as soon as possible in order to ensure continuity in services going forward.

There is currently a group of six who have been trained and have begun service as Worship Associates. We are keeping the group small for now, until they get enough experience so the role can be evaluated or fine-tuned. In the spring, it's likely more people will be added to the Worship Associate role. However, we believe the group will never be larger than around 8-10, since a person needs to do the role frequently enough to stay proficient.

If you have any questions about this, feel free to ask any member of the Worship Council.

Holiday Services: Some Personal Reflections

"We light the chalice of Love that makes all things new." That's the best way to describe the beauty, joy, inspiration, and challenge that I experienced at Sunday services during the holidays this year. It was even more inspiring – and welcome – because so many of us in the congregation were unsure how these holidays would unfold.

Following as they did immediately after Rev. Julie's last service with us, Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve services were celebrated for the first time without an assigned minister of our own. It was up to us to create the holiday experience for one another. It's a tribute to the commitment and talents of this community that we came together to do so in a way that truly made all things new.

People reached out from all parts of the congregation to help make these holidays not just usual, but special celebrations. Colleen Vahey and Amanda Richards stepped forward to ensure both Christmas Eve services would be meaningful and beautiful. Music Director Jeffrey Hamrick, the choir, and all the guest musicians outdid themselves, providing a breathtaking musical background both weekends. A host of other volunteers made all the difference—RE teachers, children, greeters, ushers, and folks who just stepped in at the last minute to help with something or solve a problem. Lois Phillips and the Aesthetics Committee transformed the sanctuary into a peaceful, "enlightened" holiday refuge. Members of the 50th Anniversary Committee extended themselves to take on providing refreshments after all the services. Of course, the incredibly hard work of members of the Worship Council pulling all of it together made all the difference. It's not enough to just say "thank you" to all these good people; but they are the only words we have.

By the time it all ended with Charles Dickens (Rev. Roger Brewin) saying farewell after the New Year's Eve service, I believed something special had happened. Many were saying these were the best holiday services Countryside Church had ever known. I haven't been a member long enough to know if that's true, but I think those comments reflect a larger reality. Regardless of what any of us may have thought about this part of a service or that part, in the end, it wasn't the services themselves that were important. It wasn't the words or a particular song or the great snacks that made the holiday experience at Countryside so special. It was the coming together of this community in heart and mind to make all things new; to put the past behind us and look forward.

During the past two weeks, this congregation said, "We are still here. We are still one. We are still a worshipping, joyful church. We celebrate our future." It will truly be a happy new year for all of us.
