The rainy weekend was a perfect backdrop for interior searching and communal sharing of our spiritual paths. It was an opportunity for what I hope we can continue to expand beyond our covenant groups and AFD retreats - an opportunity to share deep questions, honest searching, and be part of a community that helps to “create, sustain and transform” people’s lives! What an incredible gift and opportunity we have as a religious community, as this beloved community of Countryside Church.

Rev. Hilary Landau Krivchenia to be New Settled Minister

On Sunday, April 13, the members of Countryside Church voted to call Rev. Hilary Landau Krivchenia to be our next settled minister. Rev. Hilary and her family will move to this area sometime in August to begin planning activities, and she will lead her first service at Ingathering on Sunday, September 7.

During a very busy nine-day Candidating Week, many of Countryside’s members and friends got a chance to meet and talk with Rev. Hilary. Starting in the fall, we will start settling in together as Congregation and Minister and learn more about each other as we work and worship together. Meanwhile, Rev. Hilary’s Ministerial Information Packet, used during the Search, will continue to be available for your review at the church office.

The positive vote on April 13 marked the end of the responsibility of the Ministerial Search Committee, commissioned by this congregation in January 2007. Having successfully completed its work, the committee has now disbanded. All core documents created for and used for the search will be stored electronically for future reference. Once again, we are grateful to all of you who supported and sustained us through the last 16 months.

Ministerial Musings: The UU Way - Types of Unitarian Universalists

As we approach another New Membership Orientation class - "Pathways to Membership" (May 9,10 and 25) I want to express to those potential congregational members and to our existing ones my thoughts about UU "types."

I believe in the historic, essential belief our UU movement holds that encourages each of us to be real by taking risks. Part of this is to accept the right we each have to express what we think and feel - from the pulpit as well as throughout church activities; and that we do so in ways that are in accord with the tenets of love, concern, and civility.

Saying this, I would like to proffer some thoughts I have about some of the "types" of Unitarian Universalists (as I deem them to be), based upon my 40-years as a UU. I know that I, too, am a combination of these "types" - and that you, too, might very well be. Or that perhaps your type is not listed!

At any rate, I do hope that you will be forthcoming in your comments about this article - pro or con!

So here goes:

TYPE ONE UU: "Looky Loo" - curious, cautious, non-committal; sometimes takes years to feel that UU is the right choice; sometimes takes the first 3 minutes of a sermon to know that UU is the wrong choice and might very well bolt for the exit; a real shopper.

TYPE TWO UU: "Spiritually Bruised" - refugee from another faith; feels the effects of creedal, dogmatic and doctrinaire burnout; possibly volatile when asked to talk about religious upbringing; maybe cynical about religion; feels hurt and betrayed by "church."

TYPE THREE UU: "John-Jane One Note" - exuberant mono-dimensionalist; one issue feeds a spiritual energy; wants the congregation to support THE cause; might get discouraged when sees that UUs make their own choices in their own good time.

TYPE FOUR UU: "Einstein Has Nothing Over Me" - cerebralist who is usually intellectually a number of steps ahead of others, including the minister; might or might not be "wise" or "social"; a unique and wonderful type when brain links up with heart.

TYPE FOUR UU: "Mother Theresa Has Nothing Over Me" - the all-heart person; wonderful idealist; love and acceptance of differences are touchstones; quiet acts of charity; might seem tough, but can be hurt easily; hard to be around a saint for some UUs.

TYPE FIVE UU: "The Institutionalizer" - realizes that we have a history and KNOWS that history; appreciates that there is a philosophical way of being UU: that martyrs have died for our faith, that we are not just an "anything goes" movement, supports us fiercely.

TYPE SIX UU: "The Organizationalist" - part of the 10% of any group that is currently in a leadership capacity;

wants to make a difference, so pitches in and helps wherever needed; usually already over-committed; needs to watch fatigue issues.

TYPE SEVEN UU: "Just Needs to Be Here" - desires human connection; needs a place where deep values are cherished; seeks love; appreciates the conviviality and energy of a community; church represents "family" where joys and sorrows are shared.

TYPE EIGHT UU: "Bruised No More" - has evolved from TYPE TWO UU; feels wonderfully liberated now; open to a variety of religious experiences, to the fullness of life; ready to accept messages from the universe; eagerness to learn, be, and do.

TYPE NINE UU: "The Fixer" - imbibes a strong concept of justice; envisions UU as a conduit for expressing values of freedom, love, and equity through dialogue and action; seeks application of ethical, fair principles through reasoned and effective means.

TYPE TEN UU: "Seeker of Peace" - a quiet, meditative type for whom "spirituality" means turning-inward to seek universal answers; appreciates silence and simplicity; sees the common thread of love and joy taught by all great spiritual teachers.

Well, my friends, these are just some of the "UU Types" I have observed over the years. Obviously, no one person can be so stereotyped; in fact, as I already have said, most of us have varying traits that make up who we are or think we are.

But I do believe that in common, we UUs are on a pathway of discovery - each in his or her way. And may we help each other find the direction we want to go.

A Humanitarian Trip To Eradicate Polio

On Tuesday, April 22, 7-9 pm, Peggy Simonsen will share her experience participating in a Rotary International trip to Nigeria, the only country in Africa that still has pockets of polio infecting children. In visits to the incredibly poor countryside, she and her team administered oral polio vaccine to at-risk children and learned about the culture that has inhibited the total eradication of polio. Her poignant photos show the contrasting city/country living conditions, the significant projects led by local Rotary Clubs, the colorful dress worn for special events, and especially the beautiful Hausa children. Join a discussion about this effort and how micro-loans to women are changing their lives.

For forty years, since 1967, the Rev. Dr. Herb Vetter has engaged in community ministry with First Parish UU, Harvard Square. Funding has been raised outside the regular church budget. An important part of his work is the development of the nationally broadcast Cambridge Forum's weekly public affairs radio programs, later supplemented by socially responsible local and national TV.
