Ministerial Musings

Hope in a Time of Cynicism

This time of year, no matter what we call the various mid-winter events we celebrate, is a time of heightened expectations and emotions, each of us reacting differently.

Symbolically, of course, with the beginning of the return of the sun from its farthest distance from the earth and consequently the lengthening of the days – the time of the year called the “winter solstice” – lies the message to humanity: we, too, can leave the dark places of our existences, and turn toward goodness and light.

Said in another way: we can move beyond cynicism toward hope.

Actually, this journey from one attitudinal polarity toward another is an ongoing one, but one particularly called forth as a possibility at this time of year.

This is a universal, timeless message, no matter what legend or myth or tradition or liturgy or custom we human beings have used to express this journey through the dark night into the bright light of morning.

Ultimately, of course, no matter how much hope we might possess, we need to just let go and trust whatever happens – or as UU troubadour/minister Ric Masten says in his poem after he has listed a few things he hopes for:

*hope –
give it up!
and begin to trust the process.*

Still, I do believe that it is a better way to go through life with hope rather than cynicism, believing that somehow things will turn out okay – that the process of just living through the hard times, will get us through.

Masten’s simple philosophy is echoed in the more formal theological expression of another of my colleagues, Earl Holt, minister of King’s Chapel, Boston:

Liberal theology, if it can be said to have an overriding weakness, tends toward a sometimes-unrealistic optimism; hope is its central virtue. But essential as hope is, it is insufficient unless grounded in something deeper. A potent religion must address the darkness, inner and outer. That darkness is real. Moments of grace do come, but not easily or often, and it is most often those who acknowledge the darkness who recognize the grace.

Holt is telling us in effect that because of our attempt to grasp the darkness within us, that which brings us despair, confusion, fear, anger and such, we can begin to break through toward the light of awareness, peace, joy, and even satisfaction.

Intentionally moving toward the darkness – to go as far toward it as we might dare, the way the sun does as it moves away from the earth, trusting the “process” –
