## From Your Board President

Our Annual Meeting was Sunday, May 15. Thank you to all the trustees who set-up and cleaned up, as well as providing the food that everyone enjoyed; to Greg Blus for taking care of coffee; and to all those who pitched in to help with AV, childcare, set-up and clean-up. Thanks also to all of you who attended and actively participated. The annual meeting is our opportunity as members to be informed and to have a voice in choices that impact our future as a congregation. As a congregation grounded in democratic principles, our ongoing health and vibrancy is directly linked to how much of our congregation is actively engaged in discussing, voting on, and supporting the decisions made at this meeting.

Our staff updated us on plans for next year during the meeting. Their focus will be on maintaining programming that is already strong while implementing new ideas and approaches to worship, study and music that will further enhance the depth of experience we offer here at Countryside. Our staff has exciting plans for our future and is eager to act on them, with our support. We are very fortunate to

have a professional staff with such depth of experience and talent.

The financial health of Countryside was discussed, and a budget for the 2016/17 year was passed. Our revenue comes primarily from the pledges of our members. Currently, there is a gap of approximately \$15,000 between promised revenue for next year and a bare-bones budget presented by the Board. While the board had concerns about presenting a budget with a deficit, we feel that there are good reasons for taking that risk. We have lost key staff members and there has been a lot of turn-over on the board during the past several years. Time and energy of both staff and volunteers has, of necessity, been consumed in searching for new staff, managing transitions, and maintaining programming.

Now we have a full professional staff, and they are working quickly to become a cohesive team. The Board believes strongly in our staff. We also believe that it is important to give them the chance to implement the programming and ideas they have to strengthen our congregation. A balanced budget would have required a cut in staffing or a severe cut in program activities. Either of those two options would have made it next to impossible to take effective action to achieve the growth necessary for us to remain strong for the future or to implement the programming that you have said you want to see here at Countryside. After much discussion, the budget was passed by a large majority of those in attendance at the meeting. The gap in funding will need to either be met by an increase in pledges or by dipping into our reserves.

There will be a surplus from this year's budget, due to the fact that we were not fully staffed for the whole year, which will be carried over to the reserves. That surplus will not exist next year and even now should be going to areas that were cut from our budget, such as UUA dues, professional expenses for new staff, and our underfunded capital reserves. For now, it gives us a brief amount of breathing room which we must take advantage of to adapt to different ways of 'doing

church.'

For Countryside to continue to stay strong for our current membership and relevant for the next generation, we need to explore new ways of defining membership. We need to develop an approach to stewardship that gives us stable and consistent resources. We need to determine, as a congregation, the best uses for our resources, including our volunteer and staff time and talents. We need to determine effective and efficient use of our facility to support our congregation and to minimize our impact on the environment. Most importantly, we need to stop talking about what to do and take action.

The Board will be holding its annual retreat on June 18 at Countryside, and we will be opening an afternoon session to any interested members. We want to go beyond a brainstorming of ideas to developing plans for action. If you are interested in the long-term sustainability of Countryside and are willing and able to share your time and talents to make things happen, we hope you will attend. Look for details to be abored even

for details to be shared soon.

Focus Deadlines

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#### Minister's Muse

At the Annual Meeting this year, our Music Director, Alison Vernon, spoke lovingly and with great insight to those assembled. Among the wise things that she said, she reminded us that this is a healthy congregation and that it is a congregation in which the members care passionately. She also pointed out that it is that caring that makes us healthy, so that when there are differences of opinion, we can remember that the person who differs from us offers their thoughts because they care. Of course, that doesn't make them right or wrong; it does make them worth taking into account. And, even more, it makes them worth hearing in respect. There were many thoughts shared at the annual meeting and some quite divergent from one another. And most of them were right, in some way, in spite of being in opposition.

We are living in changing times – now that's always been true, but for some time, those who study American congregational life have noticed that the changes are having an impact on how people "do faith." Today, it will require inventiveness to do faith well.

I was watching a whole bunch of TED talks the other day on creativity and on creative people. What we are going to need for Unitarian Universalism to move into the future and for Countryside Church UU to thrive in that future is going to be a tremendous creativity. And watching one of Sir Ken Robinson's TED talks, I realized that as a congregation, we will need to be truly creative and that means learning how to be creative together. Sir Ken talks about the fear we instill in people about being wrong in our society. Being wrong is such a stigma that we have built a whole educational system around punishing people for it. But no one can be creative if they can't be wrong. Now, I am not suggesting rushing out and doing the wrong thing - rather, it is an attitude toward experiment, intuition, a balance of practice (action, trying) and reflection (thinking, assessing). Creativity also takes a certain ability not to leap nor to wait until the last minute (the crisis moment) but to find a sweet spot in between those two things. That's the thought of Adam Grant, another TEDster. Somehow, people who efficiently get things done long before they are due fail to give themselves the time to dig deeper into their own creative insight. The people who procrastinate (up to a point) aren't putting things off, they are thinking.

That's certainly what I have noticed in the formation of our Strategic Plan. There was an aching discomfort without one. So we got the process going and then wanted to have fast results from the process. Fast results are easy if you are going to continue as you have been all along. Fast results are both more difficult and perhaps dangerous if you need to change creatively. We took just enough time to assemble a small but strong staff, enough time for the congregation to think about social and global issues, and enough time for some research – and now possibilities, directions, and choices abound around us.

In the coming months, as we roll out Themed Ministry, Full Week Faith, Our Place in the Web of Life, the Pathfinder Process, and more food, fun, faith, and fellowship, we will all have opportunities to get down and get creative. And our greatest creativity will come when we are together, relaxed, playful, spiritually grounded, and mutually encouraging — sharing our passion for Unitarian Universalism and Countryside and our hopes for the future. We are right on time.

## From Our Director of Lifespan Religious Education (DLRE) Let Us Prav

Unitarian Universalists are often hesitant to embrace the spiritual practice of prayer. When I have spoken to congregants about prayer the resistance seems to rest in the concept that prayer is associated with conjuring up a form of supernatural intervention into our life's troubles. I can relate to this for this was how I was taught to pray as a child in the Christian tradition. I was told that God would not only hear every single one of my prayers but that all of my prayers would be answered. To a child, this was like a magic wand, and I enthusiastically prayed about everything. When my prayers were left unanswered, I was told maybe it was because I was not praying hard enough. So I prayed harder, yet still no magic. Prayer was a disappointment, and I spent many years refusing to pray or so I thought.

Frederick Buechner describes the prayers of everyday people and the form my prayers took perfectly in his book Wishful Thinking:

Everybody prays whether he thinks of it as praying or not. The odd silence you fall into when something very beautiful is happening or something very good or very bad. The ah-h-h-h! that sometimes floats up out of you as out of a Fourth of July crowd when the skyrocket bursts over the water. The stammer of pain at somebody else's pain. The stammer of joy at somebody else's joy. Whatever words or sound you use for sighing with over your own life. These are all prayers in their way. These are all spoken not just to vourself but to something even more familiar than yourself and even more strange than the world.

Prayer is a connection we make to our own spirit, our own actions, to other human beings and is how we process the world around us. It is time we spend in reflection about what we are thankful for, what we are sorry for, what we hope for, the beauty and suffering that exists together in this world and allows us to develop deeper connections to the people we love and to the people that love us. The spiritual practice of prayer means taking the time to do these things with intention.

Kierkegaard, 19<sup>th</sup> century philosopher and theologian, wrote, "*The function of prayer is not to influence God, but rather to change the nature of the one that prays.*" I completely agree that when one embarks on the spiritual practice of prayer, it does inevitably change us. It creates a more compassionate heart, it helps connect us to the needs of others, and to rest in sorrow and suffering.



# Fri., June 10 ~ Drying for Freedom

Join us at 7 pm in Atherton Hall to view and discus *Drying for Freedom*, which reveals the story of our love affair with energy, the people who are campaigning against it, the rules society has created to sustain it, and the destruction it is causing our planet. It explores how outdoor clothes drying is banned in communities across the USA and how corporate America sold its citizens the dream of electric bliss in the 1950s -- a dream which is now America's biggest export, signifying that our future is hanging on the line. ## Head, Heart, and Hands

This fall, we will be introducing a new class structure during our 9 a.m. religious education class called Head, Heart, and Hands (thinking, feeling, doing). It is a multiage class (grades K-6), and every week, there will be a team of 3 volunteer teachers to ensure the needs of all ages are being met. It loosely resembles the Montessori method but is specifically designed to meet the needs of varying age ranges and the variety of learning styles that each child brings with them on Sunday morning. Being a faith community that focuses holistically on our children's needs, we can create opportunities to create stronger connections to our faith-Unitarian Universalism. Head, Heart and Hands (3H) embraces this holistic approach and is designed to create opportunities for our children to learn and experience our faith in ways that help them flourish.

Each Sunday, children will begin in service. When they enter the classroom, they will:

- Begin with the class opening rituals: meditation/ centering, lighting the chalice, and sharing & caring (UU prayer).
- The core of the lesson will be introduced to the entire group using stories, videos, music, and/or movement.
- Children will break off into one of the three centers that all have activities focused on the lesson for the week.
- The centers are titled Head, Heart, Hands (thinking, feeling, doing). Each center will have a range of ageappropriate activities that speak to individual learning styles
  - Head Center: will have activities that are focused on reading, problem solving, journaling; activities that promote thinking.
  - \* Heart Center: will focus on creative expression through art, music, imagination; activities that stir feelings.
  - Hands Center: will focus on activities that encourage physical movement and "doing."

The class will then regroup for a short reflection and closing before being dismissed.

I hope your children will take the opportunity to learn more about Head, Heart, and Hands by joining us on this new adventure. We will meet almost every Sunday morning beginning September 18 during the 9:00 service.

### **Book Drive Success!**

We collected 1,184 items. From those, we donated 434 children's books to Bernie's Book Bank, which should help about 72 kids receive 6 books each for one se-

mester for their home library. Books were also donated to the WINGS Resale shop, the sales of which supports their women's shelters; to Palatine Public Library's used book sale, which supports that library's funding; and to the Women's Prison. Books were also donated to CCUU for our library, for classroom bookshelves, for the nursery, and to support RE lessons.

In addition, a "workbook & activity book exchange" box has been set up outside the Library (classroom 8). They can be used by adults and kids who are just hanging out; they could be taken home to help kids with their studies; or they could be taken home by an adult who just wants to trade puzzle books. The idea is that workbooks and activity books, new or used, could be donated here to find a new home in our community on a regular basis.

Many thanks to all the people who donated books and to the families who participated in the sorting day at Bernie's Book Bank on May 7. Our gratitude goes to Cara Duffy for coordinating this Faith-in-Action project and to Crystina Smith, Amy Huber, and Mike Jeschke for helping Cara with the effort.
